

John 7:1-24

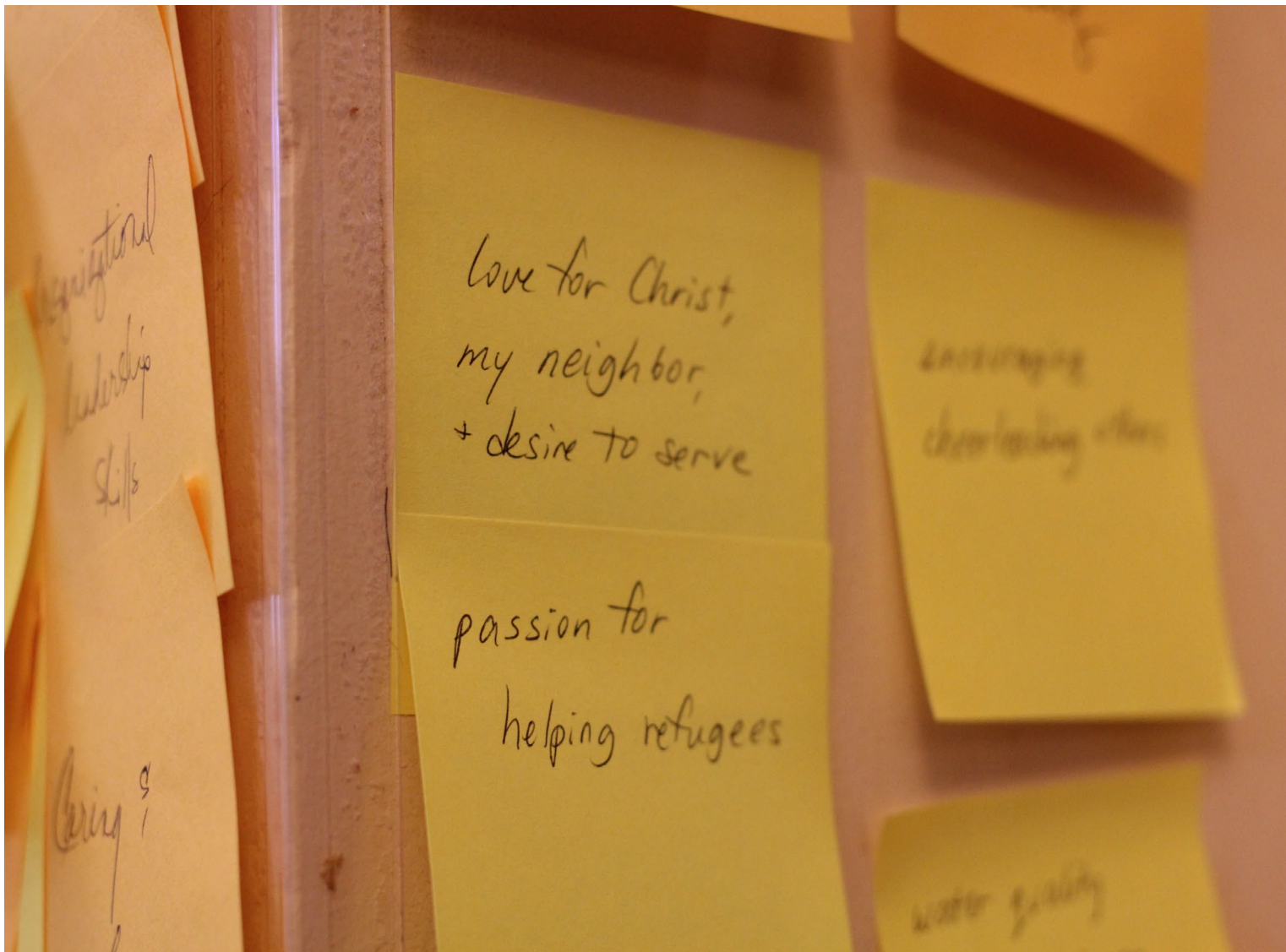
