





Being with God on the edge

Being with - the recognition that one must accompany others while they find their own methods, answers, approaches – and meanwhile celebrate and enjoy the rest of their identity that's not wrapped up in what we judge to be their problem.

The word 'edge' speaks of the conviction that God's heart is on the edge of human society, with those who have been excluded or rejected or ignored. God is most evidently encountered among those in the margins and on the edge.

Being with God on the edge - this isn't about bringing those on the imagined 'edge' into the exalted 'middle'; it's about saying we want to be where God is, and God's on the edge, so we want to be there too.

Of Jesus' time among us he spent 90% being with us in Nazareth, 9% working with us in Galilee, and 1% working for us in Jerusalem. A truly incarnate practice of mission seeks to reflect these percentages.





We see ourselves at the heart of London, through our location on Trafalgar Square, and of the nation, through our 500-year links with the royal family, and also of the church, through our national profile gained through nearly a century of broadcasting and our flagship role in social issues but also appealing to the heart through our long tradition of choral and classical music and our reputation for compassion gained through a century of engagement with poverty and destitution. Our calling is to be on the edge, not just of Trafalgar Square but alongside those on the edge through being excluded, ignored or oppressed by society or church, and on the cutting edge of innovation in culture, commerce, charity and congregational life.

Holistic approach to mission


Reflecting key essential ingredients to human flourishing

The 4Cs

The integration of this model, while rooted in a vibrant congregational life, means that the wider operations (of compassion, cultural expression & commerce) are not seen as secondary or simply instrumental to mission, but as creative & challenging forms of church in their own right.



The 4Cs

Cultural, commercial and charitable programmes rooted in a vibrant congregational life create 'a vision of a civil economy, of what work & play, friendship & worship, social concern & evangelism, diversity & identity might look like.' Sam Wells

Beyond the Benefactor & Steward

Two main models of handling money in the Bible – The Rich Young Ruler (Mark 10:17-27) & All things in common (Acts 2:42-47)

From these the Church has derived the Benefactor & Stewardship models of funding




Neither the Benefactor or Stewardship models of funding by themselves are now sufficient to fund churches

Churches need a mixed economy of funding including commercial enterprises



Commerce

HeartEdge is about the creative work of financial sustainability. This is about sustainable ways to secure things we love, but may fear are dying. HeartEdge helps secure ways to finance our vision and plan for the future. Commercial activity is a vital part of this work, a practical expression of faith, a central component in the mission of the church. Commercial activity is about maximising resources, managing risk, promoting opportunity and generating unrestricted financial income.

Assets, not deficits

The church is getting smaller and narrower. In response we focus on what our church doesn't have, who isn't there, and what problems it faces. If we begin with our hurts and stereotypes, we find a hundred reasons why we can't do things or certain kinds of people don't belong. Churches are quick to attribute their plight to a hostile culture, an indifferent, distracted population or a sinful generation.

Churches and communities thrive when the gifts of all their members are released and they build one another's assets. Sharing our particular assets (skills, experience, insights and ideas) with other members will foster a wider understanding and model the practice of hospitality towards others. God is giving the church everything it needs for the renewal of its life in the people who find themselves to be on the edge.

Improvising the kingdom



Scripture seen as 5 Act Play (Creation, Israel, Jesus, Church, Eschaton). In Act 4 we improvise our part on the basis of what has gone before and the hints we have of the ending.

Christianity must take the present opportunity to be what it was always called to be: an alternative society, overlapping and sharing space with regular society, but living in a different time - that's to say, modelling God's future in our present.

What's needed today are communities of ordinary virtues, but ones infused with grace: thus trust, honesty, politeness, forbearance, and respect are the bedrock of such communities, while tolerance, forgiveness, reconciliation, and resilience are among its abiding graces.

Catalysing kingdom communities

HeartEdge seeks the renewal of the church by catalysing kingdom communities. It aims to foster, not to impose; it sees the kingdom as God's gift to renew the church, rather than as a mission-field to be conformed to the church's image; and it sees churches as lively and dynamic communities, rather than defensive and narrow congregations.



With God together

- Recognisable communities of hope, embodying a liberating story of reconciliation & grace.
- 2. Distinctive congregations whose life is shaped & renewed through the energy & gifts of those culturally, economically and socially 'on the edge,' & whose diversity reflects the diverse glory of God.

- 3. With God: Faithful disciples who have discovered how God is made known in times of adversity & who thus walk with the dispossessed in order to be close to God.
- 4. With near neighbours: Humble institutions whose need for financial sustainability opens their lives to the skill, vision & wisdom of those who scarcely or only partly share their faith.

- 5. With oneself: Fertile centres of creative & artistic flourishing through which people apprehend beauty in the world & talent in themselves & one another.
 - 6. With Creation: Penitent communities that recognise the individual & corporate legacy of the misuse of power & the dominance of some social groups over others, nationally & internationally, & are seeking new forms of practice & relationship.



7. With distant neighbours: Thriving churches that individually & corporately are seen as an unqualified blessing by their neighbourhoods & nation.

The future is bigger than the past

The Bible was written in exile and the first disciples saw God most fully present on the cross - so adversity is the principal time of depth and discovery for the church.

In Christ, the future is bigger than the past. We don't know, but we're learning. We haven't arrived, but the journey's great. We're not sure exactly where we're going, but it's getting better all the time. We've had some wonderful experiences, but the best is yet to come.


